The name Kaimukī translates to ti root oven and is a reference to the legend of Menehune cooking in the area. Historically, the area was once the location of King Kalākaua's farmland and a place where ostriches roamed wild across "Kaimukī Hill" during the 19th century. In the following decades, the roughly two-square-mile area served as a cattle ranch and carnation farm before residential and business development began in the late 1800s. Today, Kaimukī is home to local boutiques, beloved restaurants, and nearly 19,000 residents.






